

7th annual Silent Movie Night, Fern Hill Funeral Home, Aberdeen.

Harold Lloyd's "Safety Last," accompanied by Andy Crow on the 1927 Robert Morton Theatre Organ.

There will be two showings on Tuesday, October 30th at 6:30 PM and 9 PM, in the chapel at the funeral home. And the best part is that the admission is FREE!

The Robert Morton was originally installed in the Red Apple Theatre in Omak, WA in 1927. In 1933 it was sold to Mills & Mills Funeral Parlors in Olympia, where it was used for funeral music for the next 66 years. The organ and pipes were then acquired by Lann Copeland in Victoria, BC. He refinished the console and rewired the systems. Having been an employee and an owner of the funeral home in Olympia, consequently the owner of the organ, I was interested in what happened to the Robert Morton after I left the company in 1994. With the help of my good friend, Andy Crow, we negotiated the purchase of the instrument and Andy and I brought the organ to my present funeral home in Aberdeen. With the help of Eric McLeod, the organ was installed in my funeral home, Fern Hill Funeral Home and we have had an annual silent movie night every year since, on the night before Halloween, October 30th.

We have shown "Phantom of the Opera" (twice), "Gold Rush", Hunchback of Notre Dame", "Steamboat Bill Jr." a festival of Laurel and Hardy short films, and one Easter time we had "King of Kings".

In Memoriam

Dick's love of the theatre organ began when he was a teen-ager in the 1950s. At that time he became a friend of PSTOS member Bob Jones, and through this friendship became involved in numerous theatre organ activities in the area. An avid recording enthusiast, he recorded many pipe organs installed in homes and other local venues at the time, as well as a number of well-known local organists.

Later Dick became absorbed in his business and dropped out of the organ scene. Several years ago he reconnected with his old friend Bob Jones, joined PSTOS, and attended many events.

He passed away September 23 at age 70 of pancreatic cancer. His daughter has talked with Bob Jones about her father's recordings, and the possibility of turning them over to PSTOS for archiving.

Sincere sympathy is extended to all of Dick's family and friends.

Pages From The Past..

From The Seattle Times, September 1922

OUEEN ANNE MOVIE HOUSE TO REOPEN SUNDAY

A surprise awaits Hill residents who go to the Queen Anne Theatre Sunday evening or any evening thereafter. Consistent with his policy to give his patrons the best the market affords, Mr. Steele has spared no expense in remodeling and reequipping his playhouse at Queen Anne and Boston.

\$10,000 Organ

Perhaps the most important addition to the theatre is the new \$10,000 Robert Morton Concert Auditorium Organ. The organ was originally designed and built for the municipal auditorium at Fresno, Cal., but when Mr. Steele placed his order for an organ and expressed a desire that the instrument be rushed to Seattle, the manufacturers consented to delay delivery of an instrument to Fresno and shipped the specially constructed Robert Morton to Seattle for the Q.A. Theatre.

The organ has more than 600 pipes and also includes a unit comprising everything in the line of traps, drums, bells, xylophones, and cymbals. The voice ranges from very soft to thunder-like loudness. The console comprises three keyboards and a complete series of stops. Miss Cawthorn, talented organist, will preside at the console. The organ was installed under the personal supervision of C. M. Balcom, Superintendent of Construction with Sherman, Clav & Co.

Redecorated

The theatre has also been completely redecorated under the personal direction of A. Weissenborn, of the Weissenborn Decorating Co., known all along the coast for their theatre decorating. The pictures will be flashed on a new Gardiner Silver Leaf screen installed by B. F. Shearer, Inc., dealers in theatrical equipment. This type of screen is used in all the better theatres throughout the country.

A new heating and ventilating system has been installed by the Washington Sheet Metal Works. This means that Queen Anne residents are going to enjoy the most comfortable and best ventilated picture house in the city. The beautiful drape curtain was purchased from Grunbaum Brothers Furniture Co. The new curtain adds greatly to the appearance of the interior of the theatre.

Indirect Lighting

The ornamental plaster work framing the stage opening, the artistic light containers and art vases are products of the Architectural Decorating Co., F. J. Han, manager. The indirect lighting system will surely meet with the approval of Hill movie fans. It gives ample light without the irritating glare accompanying direct lighting.

The Embassy Theatre (now the Triple Door night club) was a popular venue in 1927...

It appears a 50¢ ticket could be had for 25¢!

The Embassy 2/9 Kimball theatre organ was relocated to the Woodland Park Presbyterian Church in North Seattle. In the 1960s it became the home organ project of Harold Shawver of Edmonds, and remained in this home over 40

In 2007 it was purchased by PSTOS member Dave Luttinen and will be installed in his new Mountlake Terrace home in the near future.

ORGAN STUNT IS

SEATTLE, Feb. 13. - Local audiences are getting a peep at the cleverest organ gag ever pulled in these parts this week as Henri Le Bel, organist at the New Fox, introduces his twin baby consoles.

The midget organs are used in conjunction with the master console. The babes present a flashy appearance on the stage, being decorated futuristically in black and silver, and, from a mechanical standpoint, present a unique

The double consoles are equipped with standard pedals and key-boards of two manuals each. Each instrument is operated entirely in-dependent of the other and independent of the big console. Both pendent of the big console. Both tiny tots carry their own junction boards. On one of the small instruments is an attachment for lifting out the entire keyboard to which is attached a 150-foot cable. The gag on this is to carry the keyboard out into the audience where patrons at their will may where patrons, at their will, may sense the thrill of playing and manipulating the giant mechanism of the organ. It is planned to pull this stunt within the very near

The opening week finds Lorain Le Bel and Iris seated at the midget consoles and Henri Le Bel at the large console. It's a great gag

and clicks gloriously.
C. M. "Sandy" Balcom was the father and builder of Le Bel's two midget consoles. It's a great piece of ingenuity and the result of much planning and many nights' labor on the part of Balcom.

The installation of the two midgets gives the Fox the distinction of having the only three organs played at one time any-where outside of the Roxy Theatre, New York City.

The year of this ad is unknown, but it surely would have been during the 1920s. A clever gimmick, indeed!

California's celebrated BOB MITCHELL to be featured organist at the PSTOS Holiday Party, moving this year to Kenyon Hall...

The first thing you notice about BOB MITCHELL are his eyes. They twinkle with an innocent delight, especially when the conversation turns to music. He is tall and lanky, but still one of those men that makes a dark suit and trousers look dashing even on a hot afternoon.

Mitchell is one of the lucky ones; he has spent his entire life doing what he loves most, playing music.

When barely 10, but tall and mature for his age, his mother decided it was time for him to learn the organ so he could study the traditional music of the Episcopal Church. The only organ in Sierra Madre, CA, where he grew up, was at the local parish, where the pastor begrudgingly allowed him to practice.

He soon discovered the movies and the integral part the organ played in this then-new form of entertainment. "I told my mother, there's a pipe organ at the movie theatre and I really want to play it!" So, despite her misgivings about the abjectness and vulgarity of "movies," his mother took 12-year-old Robert down to The Strand Theatre in Pasadena where he was soon employed.

When "talkies" ushered out the era of silent pictures, Mitchell made a successful career change to other burgeoning media. Throughout the '30s he was staff organist at various times for KMTR, KEME, KHJ and from 1940 to 1965 at KFI radio.

Another contribution the church made to his musical life also included a love for choral music. He subsequently formed Mitchell Boys Choir, which provided the music for and appeared in dozens of films including "Angels with Dirty Faces" with James Cagney and the Christmas classic, "The Bishop's Wife."

His boy's choir also recorded with Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra among others. His works with the boy's choir also garnered him several illustrious honors including a Silver Medal from Princess Grace (Kelly) of Monaco, a Medal from the Pope and the Boy Scouts of America.

As vivacious as ever, the refrain of Mitchell's life has come full circle 85 years later. He plays several nights a week before his old colleagues Charlie Chaplin, Buster Keaton and other silent screen legends at the Silent Movie Theatre.

"Of course, it's music that I live for," he says, "and so with each passing day it's like a full, happy lifetime in itself."
