JONAS NORDWALL, a native of Portland, pos sesses unique talents as a concert organist. At home playing either classical or popular music, he rarely needs printed scores, improvises freely without losing the identity of the music, and is truly a master organist. He received a Bachelor of Music degree in 1970 from the University of Portland and has served as organist at First United Methodist Church in Portland for thirty years. He is also organist for the Oregon Symphony Orchestra.

A contributor to the renaissance in the popularity of the theatre organ as a recital instrument, he has recorded over 15 albums. For 10 years he was the senior staff organist for the Organ Grinder Restaurant in Portland. He has been a featured artist for numerous national ATOS conventions and in 1987 was chosen ATOS organist of the year. Regarded as one of the nation's top theatre organists, Jonas' creative arrangements and clever stylings always entertain and impress!



A letter from the past... part 3

The September 1965 issue of Console magazine carried a lengthy article entitled, "Seattle, Cradle of the American Theatre Pipe Organ." Former Seattleite Dick Simonton, [shown left holding a 16' Vox Humana pipe, circa 1960's] one of the founders of ATOE [now ATOS], immediately upon reading the article, wrote a fascinating 12-page letter to the Console editor in which he shared numerous recollections of and interesting trivia about Seattle theatres and organs during the early years. A third segment of Dick's letter is reproduced here for your enjoyment. —From the Wm. Bunch archives.

It should be realized that there was a difference in attitude between the use of the organ on the West coast and on the East coast during the silent picture days. The reason why Seattle can be considered the birth place of the theatre organ is because it was used as an instrument in its own right, and not as a substitute for an orchestra. In new York and other large eastern cities, the organ was only a poor man's substitute for an orchestra and most of the Broadway theatres in presenting the first run of the major films scored them with an orchestra of various size. This involved elaborate scoring and conducting and allowed very little flexibility for the ingenuity of the musician and actually far better musical accompaniment could be provided by some of the early day theatre organists such as Oliver Wallace and Henry Murtagh because of their great ability to improvise.



An orchestra can play only what is on the printed sheet in front of it and there is no room left for this creativity or spontaneous inspiration such as the theatre organist could exhibit. Later Gaylord Carter came along and demonstrated this rare ability.



Gaylord Carter, one of the masters of silent film accompaniment. Gaylord lived well into his 90s, and continued to play throughout his long and colorful life.

The description of the Coliseum Theatre is most interesting and describes many things about the theatre which I didn't realize. Architect B. Marcus Priteca is famous and during my years in Seattle I heard about him but never had



the opportunity of meeting him. In 1959 I was in Europe with Harold Lloyd, while he was supervising the scoring of one of his silent films, and afterwards we attended the

Interior of the Dream Theatre, Seattle, 1910. Seated at the console of the first pipe organ in any theatre in the world is Oliver Wallace, who played many years at the Seattle Liberty. He left after the "talkies" arrived and became music director for Walt Disney, writing scores for such films as *Pinocchio*, and *Snow White & the Seven Dwarfs*.


Oktoberfest in Munich. One day Mr. Lloyd was confined to his bed with a cold and so I was eating alone in the hotel and the head waiter asked if I would mind if another American gentleman joined me at my table, as they were quite busy, and I of course said I would be delighted. The gentleman who was seated at my table turned out to be Mr. Priteca of Seattle, and we immediately fell into a conversation about our favorite subject, theatres, and from him I learned a great many things.

He is still [1965] an active architect and is responsible for some of the leading concert halls and opera houses is the United States. I saw him recently in Los Angeles during the opening festivities of the L.A. Music Center. Mr. Priteca did all of the Pantages Theatres and for many years Pantages was his only client. We referred to him affectionately as Uncle Benny and while he is of Scotch origin, he has a phenomenal knowledge of theatre architecture and is a world authority.

The organ pipes from the Coliseum organ which I now have and are part of the instrument in my home, were obtained from Richard Koons, and were part of a trade for a blower which he is using on his instrument. Originally the Coliseum had a DC blower and I shipped him one from Los Angeles which was AC, as there was no DC current available. The Coliseum Theatre had an extremely short throw for the projection of the picture and always presented problems. Note that the projection room is on the front edge of the small balcony and only about 50 fee from the stage. It was always a problem to obtain lenses with a short enough focal length to accommodate such a close booth.

Seattle Paramount, which in its own way is unique in theatre history. This is a deluxe theatre but did not have an orchestra lift, but instead was the first installation of the elaborate orchestra car arrangement with pistons under the stage and a device which could roll orward carrying the complete orchestra orward or to the upstage area. When not in use, this device sank down into the main part of the stage out of the way. It was actuated by huge hydraulic rams and a very elaborate cable and pulley arrangement underneath. The theatre was built as the Seattle Theatre, but didn't open immediately due to reorganization. It was then taken over as part of the Paramount-Publix organization and opened the following year

under their banner.

Just prior to opening, some janitor or night watchman was fooling around backstage and pushed the buttons which actuated this huge orchestra car, making it rise from beneath the stage and roll forward. Somehow the limit switches failed to operate and the entire device crashed into the orchestra pit. You can imagine the commotion which this created, and while I didn't see it with my own eyes, I was given the descriptions of it by some of the older employees of the Paramount when I went there a number of years later with Clark Rush to service the organ. The result was that they delayed the opening of the theatre long enough to get this monstrous contraption dismantled and hauled back on stage and put back together, but they permanently disabled it so that it can never again be operated. To this day [1965] all of the mechanism is under the stage of the theatre but for no useful purpose. It was intended that this would be the show place of this new type orchestra car which was revolutionary at the time, but with this disastrous experience, none others were ever built and the idea began and ended with the Seattle Paramount.

I well remember being taken to the Paramount Theatre opening week, and how impressed I was with it. Another thing which impressed me was an Ampico grand piano in the mezzanine lobby, all done up fancy in cream and gold and the ushers put rolls on it and kept it going while the people were waiting. I thought this was quite a touch for Seattle. Maybe this was just a notch below those famous theatres which had organs in the lobby for the entertainment of the waiting patrons.




OLIVER WALLACE AND WIFE He Filled Theatre With Music

WALLACE of the Wurlitzer returned to Seattle for a three-day stand this week [1962 World's Fair] 27 years after he left to seek—and get—fame and fortune in Hollywood. Wallace of the Wurlitzer, known today as Oliver Wallace, composer and conductor for Walt Disney productions, left Seattle in 1925, eight years after he took over the job of playing the organ at the old Liberty Theatre.

"Seattle's just not the same," Wallace said sadly. "We went to take a look at the old Liberty only to find it's nothing but a parking lot."

A mist clouded the musician's sparkling eyes as he recalled his years of accompanying the flicks on the 1,500-pipe Liberty Wurlitzer. "The Liberty is the only theater I know of which was built around the organ. We had to do some strange things for sound effects in those days. I even had a pistol, loaded with blanks, to use at the appropriate spot during Westerns."
