Four top theatre organists to perform for grand event on famous Atlanta Fox Moller Theatre Organ.

Olympia's Washington Center Wurlitzer will be "reintroduced" with great fanfare on April 14th. Your attendance is encouraged!

PSTOS Board Member and long time theatre organ enthusiast, Les Lehne, is one of the stalwarts behind installation of the Wurlitzer in Olympia's Washington Center For The Performing Arts.

Unfortunately, the February 2001 earth-quake did massive damage to the instrument. Les has been a moving force to accomplish the repair. Your Puget Sound Theatre Organ Society contributed generously to the repair fund to assure the instrument's survival and continued exposure to the public—this being one of the primary goals of our Chapter. Zollman Pipe Organ Service (PSTOS members, Ed & Patti Zollman) was given the contract to repair the instrument, reinstalling it in such a way as to assure its stability in case of another earthquake.

Now, over a year later, repairs have been completed, and the organ will be "reintroduced" to the theatre organ community at a big public concert on Sunday, April 14, at 3:00 PM. Featured artist will be the inernationally renowned Barry Baker.

Barry is one of the world's most accomplished theatre organists, and this event will be well worth the drive. (Barry played for PSTOS at Tacoma Pizza & Pipes in November, 1993.)

Your Board urges you to support this event. Tickets are \$13.50 and open seating tickets may be purchased at the door. Reserved seating tickets may be purchased in advance online at www.washingtoncenter.org

If you wish to drive, directions are: Washington Center is located in downtown Olympia at 512 Washington St SE, in the block between 5th and Legion. From areas north or south of Olympia, take I-5 to Exit 105, City Center. Proceed through the first traffic light, through a short tunnel, and then turn right at the next light onto Capitol Way. Proceed eight blocks on Capitol Way to the third light, and turn right on Legion Way. Proceed one block, and turn left on Washington Street. Washington Center is the large beige building on the right.

PSTOS to sponsor informational booth at AKCHO Expo (Association of King County Historical Organizations) on May 25–26

Dear Editors,

'Always enjoy the newsiness of the Puget Sound Pipeline! I am sure there are members who would be interested in news of classical organ venues also. I visit Morelia and Guadalajara and Puebla each May/June for their organ festivals.

David Di Fiore, Seattle organist at University Temple Methodist Church and St. John Parish, has been invited to give a concert, May 23rd, 2002, on the monumental Walcker organ in the Cathedral of Morelia for the XXXVI International Organ Festival in that city. He is at present in the Slovak Republic and Czeck Republic giving concerts in festivals there. His newest disc, "The Grand Organ of the Castle Church of St. Catherine in Kremnica," is being released while he is in Kremnica.

The Morelia Organ Festival opens May 14th with Zigmunt W. Strzep, Polish virtuoso organist and Robin Lynn Braun (his wife), violinist. Two days later, on May 16th, the Mexican organist Jose Suarez and Horacio Franco, well-known Mexican flautist, will perform. The following week, on May 21st, Roberto Bertero of Italy will give a concert. After David Di Fiore's concert on the 23rd, the closing concert in the Festival will be on May 28th by Abraham Alvarado, Mexican organist with a brass quartet. All concerts are at 9 PM in the cathedral and last generally one hour to one hour 15 minutes with a reception following for the organist.


In November of 2001, David Di Fiore gave a brilliant concert in the Cathedral of Nuestra Senora de Guadelupe in Puerto Vallarta, Jalisco, as part of the V Cultural Festival.

The International Organ Festival of Morelia is the oldest organ festival in the Western hemisphere, having been founded 36 years ago by Dr. Alfonso Vega Nunez, Cathedral organist.

They were in a downtown campus on Huntington Avenue so I can easily get to places like Symphony Hall and some very nice restaurants, although there are also many convenient stores for mundane things.

I haven't received a note from the office of admissions about my admissions status yet, but I received an email from the organ chair saying that the news would be good because of my "strong audition."

I'm glad that it turned out well.



Seattle Bids Farewell To Music Hall - Robert Morton

As published 38 years ago in Theatre Organ Magazine, Winter 1963-1964

The last public performance of the Music Hall Robert Morton pipe organ was given on November 15, 1963, with the popular Seattle organist Dick Schrum at the console. This fine pipe organ of four manuals and 16 ranks has been sold to the Greer Motel and Restaurant in Sacramento, California, and will be removed shortly after the first of the year.

The fabulous Robert Morton organ was installed in the Music Hall, then the Fox, in 1929 by Balcom & Vaughn of Seattle, in time for the premiere opening on April 19, 1929. The organist was Jamie Erickson, who at that time was well known in the large movie palaces

throughout the West and Mid-West.

Although there are many larger theatre organs, this 16 rank Morton is probably more versatile than many through its extensive coupling and unification, and it had no trouble filling the 2200 seat theatre.

Dick Schrum is well known throughout the Northwest for his work on electronic as well as on pipe organs. He is currently playing at the Plaid Piper Tartan Room in Seattle. He also is secretary of the Puget Sound Chapter of ATOE.

The final concert started promptly at 8 pm with the playing of "California, Here I Come," as the console rose from the pit. From then on,



almost 1800 persons were treated to some two hours of theatre pipe organ music showing off every possibility of this fine Robert Morton.

Four top theatre organists to play for Virgil Fox Festival 2002... Featuring the big Moller Theatre Organ at the Atlantic City Fox Theatre

For the past 21 years, since the death of Virgil Fox in 1980, the Virgil Fox Society has scheduled a Memorial Concert. The 2001 Virgil Fox Memorial Concert took place on the Wanamaker Organ in Philadelphia's Lord & Taylor on Columbus Day weekend. Beginning in 2002, when the concert will generate a festival weekend of related events, the name will change to reflect the growing success of the Society's annual commemoration of Virgil Fox's life's work: VIRGIL FOX FESTIVAL 2002.

Steven Frank, President of the Virgil Fox Society, and Len Levasseur, Festival Producer, have chosen Atlanta's 4,500-seat Fox Theatre as the site for this year's Festival. The theatre features one of America's great theatre organs, a four manual, 42 rank Moller dubbed "Mighty Mo," which was a favorite of Virgil Fox, himself.

Four well-known organists, all classically trained but who play primarily on theatre organs will perform: Larry Embury, Tom Hazelton, Lyn Larsen, and Jonas Nordwall. The concert will take place on Sunday afternoon, September 1, at 3:00. The gala concert will contain elements of multimedia, as did Fox's famous 1970s all-Bach touring attraction, "Heavy Organ."

The day before, Saturday, August 31 will feature additional events related to VIRGIL FOX FESTIVAL 2002. That evening a former student of Fox, Richard Morris, will perform at Spivey Hall, Clayton College and State University, in nearby Jonesboro, Georgia. Artist-in Residence at Spivey Hall, Richard Morris has followed in Fox's footsteps with an international concert and recording career.

Also on Saturday, at the festival hotel's Georgian Terrace Convention Center, the Virgil Fox Society will sponsor a series of sessions on entertaining and educational subjects of interest to Virgil Fox fans and organ aficionados. Joe G. Patten, restorer and curator of the Atlanta Fox organ, will lead a session about "Mighty Mo" and the Fox Theatre. Additional sessions are being planned, and refreshments will be served.


Organs in Atlanta's large selection of churches and synagogues will be highlighted throughout the festival weekend, as will many interesting historical and entertainment attractions in Atlanta. Previous Virgil Fox Memorial Concerts have drawn participants from as far away as Australia, and so special accommodations, including late night amusements, are being arranged to attract and entertain people from outside Atlanta.


