# Pages From The Past..

The second in a series of articles about Clyde M. "Sandy" Balcom—Mr. Pipe Organ on the West Coast—and the firm he built, Balcom and Vaughan Pipe Organs.



#### Letter of instruction and praise from Sherman & Clay, 1923

#### Balcom & Vaughan prospered, even during the Great Depression

By 1932 Balcom & Vaughan had built a prospering firm. Together they launched a service organization which later became one of the largest service groups in North America. The two men, each with a helper, took care of 789 organs. Some of these were very odd instruments, most were on quarterly contracts, some oftener. Pop Vaughan was most conscientious in this field, always mailing post cards ahead to his customers so as to have the room properly heated when they arrived. The first church instrument of any size, contracted this way by the firm was in 1927, when the 3/29 Austin located in First Church of Christ Scientist, Seattle, was added to the list.

"Pop" Vaughan, after the decline of Morton sales, represented George Kilgen and Son in St. Louis, from about 1932–1947. A few of the Morton organs sold during this era were, in Seattle: the Royercroft (2/5); Music Box (2/5); Mayflower, later Music Hall (4/16); Madison (2/14); Pantages, later Roxy (3/10); McKinley Park (2/5); and the Liberty in Pasco,

Pantages and the Orpheum in Portland.

Mr. Balcom had taken on the representation of the Estev Company which lasted from 1934–1947, and for the ten years following, during 1948–1958, he represented the Reuter Organ Company in the Northwest and as far east as Montana.

#### Survival during World War II

During World War II, materials were nearly impossible to obtain and although difficult, the firm managed to survive in even better shape than before. Although almost unbelievable, the entire business was operated from Mr. Balcom's residence, a smallish abode at 114 East 51st St., Seattle. The basement with its evergrowing collection of fine power tools, turned out a steady stream of parts for new and re-build work. In many instances, hundreds of pneumatics were sent by Mr. Vaughan and his helpers on the road to Seattle by Greyhound Stage Lines. These were picked up, completely recovered with such material as was available at the time, and again placed on the stage for delivery on location.

It is said that no one can succeed entirely alone. No matter how able and conscientious we are, we need the cooperation and friendly confidence of others. Bit by bit the firm of Balcom and Vaughan began, in the 1930s, to grow-slowly at first, but always steadily. One of the firm's oldest employees, J. Clark Rush, first met Mr. Balcom in 1924, and several other of the personnel had been with him over 30 years.

#### Bill Bunch joined Balcom & Vaughan in 1939

In 1939, the well known organist of radio station KOL, Don

Isham, a lifelong friend of Balcom and Vaughan, introduced to Sandy Balcom a young organist, William J. Bunch. This young man, of great talent and mechanical ability, was to add materially to the vision and progress of the firm. He eventually became shop superintendent, demonstrator and coordinator, all rolled into one. His charm and ease in getting along with everyone soon won him a place of great respect and distinction in the firm. Bill Bunch indeed represented the firm in every respect for some 17 years, until such time as he was offered a position with the Boston firm of Aeolian Skinner.

In Boston he became superintendent of Plant #2, General Factory Superintendent, and later, Chief Engineer and Vice President of the organization.

#### New building acquired in 1945

The year 1945 marked the next step in Balcom and Vaughan's progress. That year the purchase of a building large enough and more suited to the business was negotiated and consummated. The firm consistently remained in the Green Lake District of Seattle, for the most part, among well kept residences, with ample parking area and one direct bus line to the center of the city. Two items of interest are connected with the purchase of this building. First it had originally been the old Meridian Theatre, in which a model 45 Fotoplayer was used. The second, after having been a garage for some time, it was used as a warehouse by a competitor, Mr. Charles W. Allen, since 1949 associated with the Wicks Organ Company. In order to facilitate the task of moving Mr. Allen from the premises with every vestige of good will, another warehouse close by was found, and Mr. Balcom paid Mr. Allen's rent there for a period of six months.

It was always the policy of the firm's president to put back into the firm everything possible to insure continued improvement and progress. Consequently the building at 5413 Meridian was immediately launched into a never-ending improvement program. The basement was completely dug out and cemented. The upper two floors were made acceptable in every way possible for the manufacture of fine pipe organs, including hardwood oak flooring, varnished and waxed, over the entire first floor area, and divided into suitable shops, offices, erecting rooms, windchest departments, etc. It soon became a building of which both the owners and the neighborhood were most proud.

#### An unexpected tragedy

No one could foresee the future when the Council of St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed Church in Seattle contracted for a pipe organ. It was agreed that the small Wurlitzer located in the Raymond Theatre was ideal for their needs for the moment, with the substitution of one rank of pipes for a soft voice. In due time Ernest Smith and "Pop" Vaughan left for Raymond to remove the instrument from the theatre.

This job was to spell a tragedy for the firm. After a few days work, Mr. Vaughan returned to the hotel after dinner one evening to lie down. When Ernest Smith returned from a walk, he found the firm's partner had passed quietly away while resting in his hotel room. This was in 1947.

"Pop" Vaughan's death marked the end of a happy partnership of some 25 years. Although 12 years Sandy Balcom's senior, Pop loved the organ and everything connected with it in a most enthusiastic way. He was an efficient organizer and extremely well thought of by a great host of people. Indeed it spelled a grave loss for the Seattle firm.

#### Electronic organs —a brand new era

Almost simultaneously, the appearance of the post-war electronic instruments spelled the first of an association with several well known names. Through Sherman Clay, Mr. Balcom had been offered the Hammond dealership, which was refused, and afterwards a number of others. The Wurlitzer company had bought out the rights to the Everett Orgatron and had begun to manufacture them under their own name.

Because of the legal (although not financial) partnership of the firm, it became necessary to raise a rather large amount of cash to buy out the interest now belonging to Mr. Vaughan's widow. This was done in very short order through the introduction of the electronic Wurlitzer and the super sales effort of Mr. Balcom. The instrument was put on display in the lobby of the University Methodist Temple, and was demonstrated by organist Walter A. Eichinger, FAGO.

This unexpected explosion into the electronic organ field brought about a decision. With the furnishing of a very lovely corner located in the Music Hall Theatre building downtown, Balcom and Vaughan took on several dealerships for pianos and organs, (photo below) as well as continuing the pipe organ business. The growing of this business brought about yet another decision in 1950—giving up the organ ser-

vice business. This was sold to four interested parties in four different areas, two in Seattle, one in Portland and one in the Utah area. The largest group of about 200 contracts went to the newly formed partners of Northwest Organ Service, J. Clark Rush and Del Feely. Mr. Rush had previously worked in service, and it removed just one man from the plant, Mr. Feely. Each obtained the services of a helper and thus began a partnership in the organ service business that lasted until January, 1965.



This new business had no connection with Balcom and Vaughan, although parts and material were occasionally ordered through the firm.

After 1950 the electronic business grew by leaps and bounds. This is not to say the pipe organ business stood still, far from it. For five years, from 1950 to 1955, the firm was approached by the Mormon Church to build organs in addition to their regular course of work. In this period, organs of every size were shipped in the firm's own trucks from Seattle to Utah, Idaho, New Mexico, California and Colorado. The firm finished an outstanding 3/36 organ for the Ogden State Center Tabernacle. Many of these instruments were opened by the Tabernacle organists from Salt Lake City, and servicemen were trained in Seattle to care for these organs. Occasional work continued to be sandwiched in for the Salt Lake area, including a 2/9 known as Opus 742, for Winder 6th Ward Chapel, Salt Lake City.

In all, some 83 instruments were completed in that time. Mr. Balcom asked for a temporary moratorium from the work just to catch up with some local needs.

#### If you begin the day at Yelm's ST. COLUMBAN CHURCH

FROM I-5 Southbound, take exit #111 MARVIN RD / HWY 510 (Between Tacoma and Olympia) onto Marvin Rd. Drive 1.5 miles, crossing Martin Way and Steilacoom Rd. You will reach an intersection where you will turn left, staying on Hwy 510. Continue on Hwy 510 East to the traffic light in downtown Yelm. Turn RIGHT on 1st St. S., which is Hwy 507. The Parish Hall is on the left a short distance from the traffic light. It is a large building set back from the highway. Park in the church lot. FROM I-5 Northbound, use Exit 88 and follow map at left.

## From ST. COLUMBAN CHURCH HALL to

Turn right out of the church lot onto 1st St So. toward Mosman Ave SW. Turn LEFT at WA-510/Yelm Ave W. and drive 6.4 miles to the intersection with Yelm Hwy SE. Turn LEFT and drive 6.7 miles.
