DAGES FROM THE DAST ... Treasures from the Archives

Organs installed in small town theatres during the 1920s received very special exposure in local newspapers! In July, 1921, Pasco's Liberty Theatre celebrated installation of its new 2/4 Robert Morton Style 75 organ with a special opening concert and demonstration, complete with interesting news coverage.

Tuesday and Wednesday July, 19 and 20

Opening of the New Pipe Organ

For two days, beginning July 19, music-loving people of Pasco and vicinity will be given an opportunity of hearing the New ROBERT MORTON PIPE ORGAN at the LIBERTY THEATRE, played by an expert musician.

Mr. Glen Goff, formerly of the Covent Garden Theatre, Chicago, and the California Theatre, Los Angeles, but at present located on the Pacific Coast, has been engaged as special musician for the two days.

DAGES FROM THE DAST ... Continued

NEW PIPE ORGAN IS MARVELOUS INSTRUMENT

When the public enters the Liberty Theatre after the nineteenth, they will not notice

any great changes, the restoration of the orchestra pit being the most noticeable. If they look around a little farther they will find a shuttered window, apparently on the south wall just in front of the stage. Little will they dream what is concealed in that window until the operator sits down to the keyboard in the pit and starts playing.


Soon they will discover that the one operator has at her command, obeying her every touch, a complete orchestra, and it is all concealed behind those shutters.

A slight conception of what this instrument is may be had from the following facts pertaining to it. It has been under erection for three weeks, that time being necessary to install the many complicated parts, such as hundreds of electric magnets, valves, pneumatics, pipes, cables, contacts, chests, tremolos, etc.

The instrument has its own generating plant furnishing 10 volts, 20 ampere current. As the action of the organ is electric throughout and so much depends on a quick response to the organist's touch at the keyboard, the generator really plays an important part in the correctness of the playing.

The wind used to supply different pipes, effects, etc., is supplied by a large blower driven by a 3 H.P. motor turning 1300 revolutions per minute, delivering approximately twelve pounds to the square inch at the organ.

It is voiced strictly orchestral, giving absolute imitations of such instruments as Orchestral Oboe, Saxophone, French horn, Flute, Piccolo, Violin, Cello, Bass viola, Cornet, Drums, Xylophone, Chimes, Tambourine, Tot tom, and others. Special attention is called to the string harp in this instrument and is known as the Harp Celeste. It is also equipped with the Vox Humana pipes The Liberty Theatre's new Robert Morton organ received interesting newspaper coverage...



for the reproduction of the human voice. The organ is being installed by C. M. Balcom, superintendent of construction and his assistant, C. Johnson, both from the New Mission Theater, San Francisco, where they just installed a \$50,000.00 organ. This instrument is known as the Robert Morton Orchestral Pipe Organ.

AUSPICIOUS OPENING OF PIPE ORGAN AT THEATRE

Manager Reynolds of the Liberty Theatre has been busy receiving congratulations upon the complete success of the opening of the Robert Morton Pipe Organ Tuesday evening. This instrument differs from the ordinary church organ in that it is electrically unified and controlled, thus making a quick response to the touch of the operator and enabling it to keep pace with the most rapid action of the screen production.

> It is also equipped with a complete orchestrion and can be used to produce the music of both brass and string instruments at will. Glenn Goff, who presided at the opening recital, proved to be an artist of exceptional ability and the large audience expressed appreciation by enthusiastically applauding every number. In addition to the instrumental selections, Mr. Goff further delighted the patrons with a vocal selection entitled "Nesting Time."

> > The screen offering was the inimitable "Fatty" Arbuckle in "Brewster's Millions." This picture shows the star in a distinct departure from the slap stick offerings in which he generally appears and is a decided improvement over his previous offerings. In fact it is a masterpiece of the absurd,

created for laughing purposes only and it certainly delivers the goods. The excellent photography and rapid action reinforced by Mr Goff's wonderful musical interpretation furnished an entertainment such as is seldom equaled.

Mr. Reynolds now has the most complete equipment of any picture house outside of the larger cities of this state.

He doubtless will receive from an appreciative public the patronage that his efforts to please deserve.

The CALVARY CHRISTIAN ASSEMBLY ORGAN was originally installed in 1942 and was based on a 2-manual 12-rank Kimball from Centralia's Liberty Theatre. In 1970 it was rebuilt and enlarged with the addition of a Wurlitzer Style 215 "Special," formerly owned by Lorin Whitney and installed in California's Hollywood Theatre. The combined Kimball-Wurlitzer instrument now has a total of 23 ranks. PSTOS worked closely with the church to ready the organ for the ATOS Annual Convention in 2010.



DAVE WICKERHAM was born in California and began playing pipe organ at the young age of 10! At 14, he and his family moved to Arizona and Dave became Associate Organist at the famous Organ Stop Pizza Restaurants in Phoenix, Mesa and Tucson. He attended the University of Arizona on a full scholarship, studying classical organ.

Besides having been a featured performer at the 2010 ATOS convention right here in the NW, Dave has been staff organist at Pipes & Pizza in Lansing, and at the Piper Music Palace in Greenfield, both in Illinois. In 2000, the family moved to Las Vegas where Dave was a featured organist at "Roxy's Pipe Organ Pizzeria", part of a \$26,000,000 expansion phase at the FIESTA Casino and Hotel. Later the family lived seven years in South Florida where Dave was Organist - Curator with the legendary Milhous Collection. Dave and his family currently enjoy living in Upper Michigan where he is Organist in Residence at Crystal Theatre in Crystal Falls. This venue is a regional Performing Arts Center and houses a 3 manual, 21 rank Moller theatre organ that Dave also looks after.

Dave has toured Australia/New Zealand three times, playing to sold-out houses in all the major cities. The most recent tour was in October, 2012.
