Pipe Organ Terminology

CONSOLE—in a pipe organ, this term refers to the "key desk" of an organ, containing manuals, pedals, stops, couplers, music rack, and other devices used by the organist to control the sounds produced by the pipes. The term does not include the pipes themselves which are usually located in separate rooms called "chambers" and which are collectively referred to as the organ. Thus a pipe organ consists of the console, which is the part you can see, and the *organ* which is usually hidden from view.

This can be slightly confusing to folks whose organ experience has been exclusively with self-contained electronic instruments, the console of which is generally referred to as the organ, and which contains not only all the devices used by the organist to control the sounds, but which also contains all the sound-generating electronics, speakers, etc. If an electronic organ is also equipped with external speakers, these would roughly equate to the pipe chambers of a pipe organ.



Pages From The Past...

The following article wins our prize for gross exaggeration! It appeared in the Vallejo (Calif.) Times-Herald on May 17, 1956. The instrument Vurlitzer Opus 1942, originally shipped to Chicago's Paradise Theatre on August 28, 1928. In 1951 it was purchased by Richard Vaughn in 1967, it was acquired by Bill Brown, of Phoenix, and resides in his home today. The top photo (pedalboard removed and cables coiled ready to be moved) shows the console as it was decorated for use in the theatre. It was later remodelled, with the style vastly simplified, as shown in the lower photo.

HOLLYWOOD — The eighth wonder of the world might easily be the earth's largest orchestral pipe organ, which is stuffed into a private home a stone's throw from movieland.

Owner of the huge device is Richard Vaughn, a softspoken 33-year-old record company executive who doesn't know how to play it.

The console, or keyboard, is located in his living room and resembles nothing so much as a dozen pianos stacked on top of one another. It contains 256 stop keys, 337 manual and pedal keys, five banks of keyboards.

A CABLE runs to the basement where Vaughn has crammed five cavernous rooms with 3,100 pipes, percussion instruments, electrical equipment and a windmaking machine.

"The generator creates a wind equal to a 40-mph gale," Vaughn said modestly. "There are more than 10,000 wires in the main cable, and a million or so electrical connections in all."

An electrical engineer, Vaughn bought his 10-room anish-style home in 1949 to house the gigantic mstrument.

I bought the organ from the Paradise Theatre in Chicago," said Vaughn. "We brought it out here in a 35foot trailer truck and a railway boxcar. It took five people 71 days, working 16 hours daily, to install it.

"THE LAST Wurlitzer like this was built in 1939 for about \$120,000. There are only two others like it."





Why does a man fill his home with such a machine? "Because I like organ music," he answered simply.

It's a good thing he hasn't taken a fancy to Guy Lombardo's band. There wouldn't be enough sleeping space in the house for that many musicians.

"Ever since I was a youngster I was attracted to organs. There was so much going on that you couldn't see. It makes a person curious.

"I'M STUCK with it now," he added, sounding like a man who had been bequeathed a herd of elephants.

"I do most of the electrical repairs," Vaughn went on. "There are 35 instruments represented, including 61 trumpets and saxes and 400 violin sounds. If all the stops were used at top volume it would sound like an H-bomb explosion."

Among the offbeat instruments are a glockenspiel, tambourines and a Chinese gong.

"THESE WALLS are a foot thick," Vaughn explained. "The whole house vibrates when the organ is going, but you can't hear it across the street."

His hobby became a million-dollar business when Vaughn formed his own record company (High-Fidelity Recordings, Inc.) last year [1955] to wax long-play albums with George Wright at the console. Thus far he's sold more than 200,000 copies—at five bucks per.

"Only drawback about the whole business," says bachelor Vaughn. "You can have a wife or you can own a pipe organ but not at the same time!"
