Pages From The Past..


Roller skating rinks were popular entertainment centers in the late 1940s into the 1950. The Puget Sound area boasted a number of busy rinks, one of which is featured here.

A circular promoting Redondo Beach Skating Arena provides a fascinating look at this once popular activity.


In directing this circular to you, we take pleasure in presenting a program that serves a recreational need, and in many cases can enrich your club or organization treasury very substantially. The location of the Redondo Skating Arena, (one mile west of the Seattle-Tacoma Hiway at South 272nd

or 296th St.) being 20 miles south of Seattle and 12 miles north of Tacoma and only a few miles from Renton, Kent, Auburn, Enumclaw, Sumner, Buckley, Dash Point, Browns Point, Milton, Highline, Burien and DesMoines, makes it a central location for gatherings of groups of the same order to meet for skating parties.

If you have never visited the Arena, words can hardly describe that which you actually see. Upon entering the Arena you are immediately impressed with the atmosphere of refinement as you face the Box Office, Entrance and Exit Doors made of mahogany setting on a rich, heavily padded lobby carpet that extends over 100 feet past the Sales, Check and Skate Room windows. Mirrors on your right the entire distance could easily reflect your outward expression of surprise and satisfaction after viewing the large smooth skating surface, the beautiful lighting arrangement and decorative ceiling.



These pipes are not behind glass, however. The advertising copy on the inside of the circular tells many details about the interior of the building and the area served by the Arena.

n the large windows of the Sales Room you may see skating equipment for most every need at the very lowest prices. The Check Room is operated for the convenience of the patrons without charge and in the Skate room, personal service, courteous treatment and good equipment are outstanding.

The pride of the Redondo Arena is the big Wurlitzer Pipe organ recently installed. This organ is the largest to be found in any Roller Rink in the world. Its beautiful rhythmic skating music that carries you along with so little effort is played by one of the most outstanding organists on the Pacific Coast. To the thousands of skaters who have enjoyed his fine music, Eved Oliver needs no introduction. To the new patrons visiting the Arena he likes to have them call him "Shorty." He is seated at the big four manual console close to the passing skaters and is always willing to play requests when they do not conflict with the skating program.




The Redondo Beach Organ—The 4-manual 10-rank pipe organ built by Seattle's Balcom & Vaughan was installed in the Redondo Arena in July, 1948. The console was a Balcom & Vaughan creation, most likely using a Wurlitzer console as a foundation. It appeared to have been constructed without a combination action as no pistons are shown between the manuals. Many of the component parts of this organ are Wurlitzer but the sketchy records available today indicate that a large portion of the Robert Morton theatre organ from the Egyptian Theatre in Seattle's University district became part of this organ. The Redondo Beach Skating Rink along with its organ was totally destroyed by fire in 1955. (See photos below.) res of undetermined origin in the early 1950s took a heavy toll on skating rinks in the Puget Sound area. Numerous wonderful theatre organs were lost.

Washington and Oregon were havens for skating rinks with theatre pipe organs in the 1940s and '50s and even into the '60s. Balcom & Vaughan's records show that the firm installed fifteen and there could easily have been another ten to fifteen that were installed by other organ firms.

Today in the U.S. There are only two roller skating rinks with live pipe organ accompaniment still operating. The

granddaddy of them all is the Oaks Rink in Portland. In 2005 "The Oaks" will celebrate its 100th year of continuous operation.

Drive directions to Haller Lake Community Club

Northbound I-5: Use Exit 174 onto NE I 30th St., turn left over freeway one long block to Ist Ave. N.E. Turn left (south) one block to I 28th*. Right on N.E. I 28th a few blocks to Densmore. Left on Densmore, clubhouse is on the right.

Parking both front and rear. Southbound I-5: Use Exit I 75 onto N.E. I 45th, turn right one block to I st Ave. N.E. Left (south) through N.E. I 30th to N.E. I 28th. Continue where underlined above.

ATOS competitions and opportunities...

HOBBYISTS, TAKE NOTE!

ATOS has announced its 2004
Hobbyist Competition for nonprofessional organist members ages 22105. This program was established to
help all hobbyist organists to become
more familiar with the theatre pipe
organ. Every entrant will receive
helpful written comments from the
judges. The winners will receive
plaques awarded at the Annual Convention. The whole idea is to have fun!
Entries must be submitted on tape and
must be played on a theatre pipe organ.
Entries must be sent by April 15, 2004,
the same day as your tax return.

No access to pipes? Electronic organ entries are accepted!

If you don't have access to a theatre pipe organ or would prefer to make your tape on an electronic instrument, you need to enter the 2004 Electronic Theatre Organ Competition.

There are three age divisions.

There are three age divisions here, youth 13-21, adult 22-100 and over 100. There will be first, second and third place winners in each division. Prizes will be a Certificate awarded at the Annual Awards Banquet as well as recognition in the Theatre Organ magazine. Entries must be received by March 20, 2004.

Young Theatre Organist Competition

The 2004 Young Theatre Organist Competition also has three age groups, Junior, 13-15; Intermediate, 16-18; and Senior, 19-21. The winner in each category will attend the annual convention and receive a \$300 honorarium. The overall winner will be selected at the convention and receive an additional \$300 plus the opportunity to perform a concert at the 2005 convention in Los Angeles. Entries for this competition must be received by March 20, 2004.

ATOS Mentor Program

The ATOS Mentor Program gives the selected qualifying member of ATOS the opportunity to experience a personal and private coaching session with an internationally know theatre organ concert artist/educator. To qualify, you must send a letter or email telling a few things about yourself and your present abilities at the organ. Your letter must be received by April 15, 2004.
